Interview with HENDRO JONATHAN MANURUNG

reeting Director Hendro, nice to have you participate in this special edition focusing on the activities of ITPC Lagos. Can you please introduce yourself to our global readers? My name is Hendro Jonathan, I am the Head of Indonesian Trade Promotion Center in Lagos. We are part of Ministry of Trade Republic of Indonesia and Embassy of Indonesia in Abuja that has mission to develop and increase trade relationship between Indonesia and Nigeria ,especially providing business here to find best Indonesian suppliers to grow their business together. Our office is in Indonesian Embassy office in Victoria Island, Lagos. I work here since February 2021.

2. What is the impact of ITPC Lagos since its establishment in 2009 in promoting mutual prosperity between Nigeria and Indonesia?

I believe the existence of my office has impact in the positive ways for both benefit Nigeria business and Indonesia business communities the most. We continue to open more business relationship not only in Lagos as the trade city but also to other trade cities from other region in Nigeria such as Abuja, Kano, Port Harcourt, etc.



Beyond Nigeria, ITPC Lagos also promotes trade between Indonesia and other West African countries. How have been your experience promoting trade ties between these countries?

As we know Nigeria has more than 200 million people with a lot potential for businesses, we also know Nigeria has its own challenge and barrier. That's why ITPC visited Cameroun, Ghana, Benin, Togo, etc to talk with business people about trade opportunities. Our accreditation is following Embassy of Indonesia which cover total 14 countries. ITPC experience is good albeit challenge of fuel and prices rising and post covid and war affecting West Africa. We need to follow up these inquiries so in the end more and more business connected with Indonesia.

Your current position as the Director of ITPC Lagos has been eventful. What are the successes and challenges so far?

It took a lot of economic effort and patience to do business here. Some of the successes are we successfully combining many online and offline business matching from early 2021 due to covid restriction. We bridge the trademark protection in Nigeria and also NAFDAC for those companies that want to register their products in Nigeria.

The only challenge that we face during my terms is PANDEMIC Covid 19 and also war in Ukraine that impacting global supply that makes a significant impact to world's economy especially Nigeria's economy in general.

Biofarma and delivered to a total of 1,580,000 doses of Penta Valent Vaccines donated by Indonesian Government to Nigeria through the Indonesian Aid Agency. I am delighted to inform you all that for this donation, A total of 730,000 doses arrived Nigeria on 30th May 2023 and the total of 850,000 arrived on the 14th of June 2023 to make a total of 1,580,000 doses of vaccines. Women's Guide to Cyber Safety

nline, women are s u b j e c t e d t o harassment, violence, oppression, and just generally uncomfortable situations that few (if any) men have to deal with. The Economist Intelligence Unit conducted a study reporting that 85% of women worldwide had witnessed online violence against other women. In the EU alone, 10% of women report having experienced cyber-harassment since age 15.

The effects of cyber harassment can be debilitating and have real-life consequences such as low self-esteem, insomnia, depression, and suicidal thoughts. Fortunately, the ever-growing awareness of cyber violence against women has brought with it some useful tools and strategies for preventing and addressing online harassment.

You have a right to feel safe in your own skin and participate in the world in all of its forms. With this cyber safety guide, you'll have the tools you need to minimize, prevent, and handle the many different forms of online harassment.

How to Protect Yourself from Social Media

Harassment

The most frequent social media users worldwide are 15-ye ar-old girls, and unfortunately, this is also the age at which most girls report their first encounter with online harassment. While young girls typically learn better strategies for managing online harassment as they age and continue using social media, 42% of women's behavioral response toward harassment is still simply to ignore it.

Harassment on social media isn't limited to women alone, but there's no denying that social media harassment is far worse for women than it is for men. Women have to deal with disgusting comments about their bodies, unsolicited dick pics, death threats, rape threats, and worse. And studies show that trans women are even more at risk for incurring violence on and offline. Online transphobia and harassment towards trans women often involves intentional misgendering, deadnaming, and transphobic slurs, all of which take a significant toll on trans women's mental health and self-esteem.

It's not all bad news, though. Women everywhere are empowering themselves with social media to call attention to these issues and more, mainly through the #metoo movement. Beyond drawing attention to the violence and maltreatment individual women experience, the movement is awakening the world to the larger systemic issues women face.

We have the right to feel safe in person, and we deserve to feel secure online. Protecting yourself from social media harassment doesn't mean you have to delete your accounts and lose touch with your network, though.

There are actually a lot of things you can do to protect yourself and still participate. Some sites and apps have platform-specific options, but there are some general guidelines and tips that apply everywhere.

To make things easy. I've outlined both things women can do in general and platform-specific features that can keep you safe.

Social Media Best Practices




he first thing you should do when someone starts harassing you or you see someone being harassed is to block and report them. This isn't an ideal system, because we know from past controversies that




clear harassment sometimes gets ignored and people can make new accounts after you block them. But at least this way, the person can't contact you anymore.

retty much all a p p s a n d websites give you the ability to prevent others from tagging, manage who can send you direct messages, and control your



discoverability. You may want to leave your profile open on some sites and make it very private on others, but I highly recommend at the very least choosing the options that don't allow strangers to DM you. Once I did that, it made my inbox a much friendlier place to be.

t's nearly never a good idea to tag your exact location on social media in the moment. This leaves you open to stalking and makes your profiles much easier for random weirdos to find. If you do want to share your



location, do it after you've left or choose something more general. For example, choose the city you're in — not the neighborhood.

e mindful of whose friend requests you accept. If their name and profile picture don't ring a bell and you have no mutual friends, it's probably not a good idea to accept. These followers could be



Manage Your Contacts

Ensure that you know the person before accepting a friend or follow request.

scammers, bots, or, worst of all, a "finsta" (fake Instagram) account. Finstas are becoming a popular way to hide what you're doing from other people as well as stalk people who have blocked them. If you do accept requests from people you don't know or from business accounts, be careful not to share too much personal information.





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
